OUR SPEAKER: DAVID
CURREY

David Currey is Executive Director of Travellers Rest Plantation and Museum in Nashville, Tennessee—the historic 1799 Overton home that served as headquarters for General John Bell Hood and the Army of Tennessee for two weeks prior to the December, 1864 Battle of Nashville.

In addition to these duties, David is also a consultant to other museums and historic sites. Two of his most recent projects include serving as historian and exhibit designer for Fort Negley Historical Park and Visitors Center and also as project director regarding a heritage tourism and preservation plan for the 1863 Tullahoma Campaign.

When not consulting, David writes and produces historical documentaries. In 2005 he released *The Battle for Nashville*, a one-hour film that focuses on the city during the Civil War through the use of hundreds of period photographs, eyewitness accounts, and interviews with leading historians, among them Ed Bearss.

Currently David is working on a documentary depicting an expedition he joined last year in which he embarked upon a study of the battlefield where Sargeant York won the Medal of Honor during World War I.

David, his wife, and their two children live in Nashville—a city he and his family have called home for eight generations.

His Power Point presentation will encompass many interesting and unusual photographs of Nashville during the war.

SOCIETY OF WOMEN AND THE CIVIL WAR CONFERENCE

The Society of Women and the Civil War (www.swcw.org) is contacting Civil War Round Tables throughout the country in the hope of expanding its membership.

The society will be holding its ninth conference in Chester County, PA from July 27th – July 29, 2007. Members include authors, researchers, archivists, historians,

librarians, genealogists, teachers, reenactors, history enthusiasts, etc.

Past conferences have been held at Hood College, Shenandoah University, the Museum of the Confederacy, and Virginia Tech University. Since its inception in 1997, SWCW has become one of the premier organizations promoting research and the dissemination of information on women and the Civil War.

There is an open invitation to this year's conference to any and all individuals interested in the contributions of women during the war.

CIVIL WAR PRESERVATION TRUST NEWS CONFERENCE

At its March 13, 2007 news conference, Civil War Preservation Trust President Jim Lighthizer identified the most threatened Civil War sites in the United States. You will recall that some of Lighthizer's observations and commentary were detailed in the March issue of the *General Orders*.

Not previously mentioned, however, was the fact that joining Lighthizer at the news conference was colorful former Texas Congressman Charlie Wilson, whose ancestor served with the 1st Alabama at Spring Hill, Tennessee, and former New York Congressman Bob Mrazek, a noted Civil War novelist.

Wilson is the central character of the best selling book *Charlie Wilson's War* (a fascinating read, by the way), which is soon to be a major motion picture starring Tom Hanks, Julia Roberts, and Philip Seymour Hoffman.



In their remarks, both lawmakers expressed strong support for the Civil War Battlefield Preservation Program, the principal federal program for protecting historic battlefield lands. According to Wilson, the program has been used to save

more than 14,000 acres of hallowed ground

nationwide.

Also participating in the news conference, by the way, was Dr. Libby O'Connell, Chief Historian of The History Channel. O'Connell developed and oversees "Save Our History," the History Channel's campaign programming for historic preservation.
