
The HCWRT PRESENTS

Jack Waugh "Maxey and the Indians"

This month we are happy to welcome John "Jack" Waugh to Houston as our featured speaker.

Sam Bell Maxey, a Texan, graduated next to last in the West Point class of 1846, losing a hard race for last place with George E. Pickett. It was probably the last time he lost an important engagement. In the Civil War he rose to heights far loftier than his standing in the class would indicate. He became a major general in the Confederate army and in the last year of the war was saddled with one of the most difficult of all possible assignments--commanding the Confederate Indians in Indian Territory, today's Oklahoma. Maxey took on the assignment with relish. for he knew success with the Indians was necessarily for the safety of north Texas. Successfully commanding Indians, who had minds of their own and a very faint sense of discipline was not easy. Others before him had broken their lance trying it. This talk will tell of Maxey and the Indians and how he fared this assignment to end all assignments.


Mr. Waugh is journalist turned historical reporter. Beginning his career journalism spent seventeen vears as staff correspondent and bureau chief with The Christian Science Monitor. he then his skills used working as media specialist for Republican Vice

President Nelson Rockefeller and press secretary to Democratic U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman of New Mexico. In 1989 he began his stint in "historical reporting" and has been published eleven times. His first book, *The Class of 1846*, published in 1994, won the New York Civil War Round Table's Fletcher Pratt Literary Award for the best non-fiction book of that year. The latest being *How Historians Work: Retelling the Past - from the Civil War to the Wider World*, which was released in December of 2010. He reports, "Covering the past is not unlike covering the present, except all my sources are dead (I prefer it that way). It also means I can return to my favorite century, the 19th, on a daily basis."

Between stints in the newspaper and political worlds, and since, he has contributed to periodicals, including Civil War History, American Heritage, Civil War Times Illustrated, Columbiad, The Washington Post Book World, The New York Times, The New Republic, The Nation, The Los Angeles Times Magazine, The Boston Globe, The Boston Herald American, and Country Magazine. Over the years he has also been a consultant to various organizations -National Archives and Records Administration, U.S. Department of Energy, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Atlantic Richfield Company, President's Council on Environmental Quality, Public

Broadcasting Service (PBS), and West Virginia Public Radio.

Born in California, and reared in Arizona, Waugh now lives in North Texas. He is a product of the Tucson public schools and the University of Arizona where he majored in journalism, and minored in history. He also did graduate work in history and political science at UCLA and St. Johns College. He is married to a social work administrator and a Texan. They have two grown children, and four grandchildren.

Day 2: Spotsylvania Courthouse: Todd's Tavern, Laurel Hill/Spindle Farm, Sedgwick's Wounding Site, Upton's Attack, Lunch at the Battlefield Exhibit Shelter Bloody Angle, Lee's Last Line

Day 3: Cold Harbor: Carmel Church, North Anna Battlefield Park/Ox Ford, Haw's Shop/Enon Church, Totopotomoy/Shelton House or the School Lunch either at Enon Church or at Shelton House Bethesda Church Site
