

Dr. Tom Carhart Speaking on the Topic; "LOST TRIUMPH: LEE'S REAL PLAN AT GETTYSBURG -AND WHY IT FAILED"

The Houston Civil War Round Table is delighted to welcome Dr. Tom Carhart, who will be discussing his book entitled *Lost Triumph*. Please note this is a change in the topic that we had previously advertised as "West Point Civil War Rivalries" about the book entitled *Sacred Ties*.

As Dr. Carhart explains it himself; "In brief, I think I have discovered why Lee gave such a lackluster performance at Gettysburg, and why he launched Pickett's Charge, unsupported, into the heart of the Union defenses. That attack by only 9 brigades out of the 43 he had available for the task is the tip off, for Lee's REAL plan was a three-part attack: most people know about Longstreet's attack (known as Pickett's Charge), but few are aware that an attack on Culp's Hill by 7 brigades was supposed to take place at the same time. Why didn't that happen? Because the triggering event for those 7 brigades

would have been the arrival in the rear of Culp's Hill of J.E.B. Stuart and his 6,000 screaming Rebel cavalry. Stuart would have dropped off Jenkins' Brigade of mounted infantry (around 1000 men) to attack Culp's Hill (then manned by 3,000 Union soldiers) from the rear while it was simultaneously attacked from the front by 7 Confederate brigades (about 10,000 men) and then proceeded to roll up the Union right. Meanwhile, the other 5000 Rebel horsemen would have cut directly across the hook of the "Fish hook" Union formation and met Pickett's men at the Copse of Trees, thus cutting the Union army in half, and from there Lee's army would have proceeded to defeat the Union Army of the Potomac in detail. So why didn't Stuart show up? Because he and his 6,000 men had been stopped on East Cavalry Field by the brash young Union Brigadier General George Armstrong Custer with 1800 men from his Michigan brigade -- and in so doing, as I develop in some detail, Custer did, on that day and in that place, truly save the Union."

About Dr. Tom Carhart



Tom Carhart, Ph.D., graduated from West Point in 1966 and subsequently served as an infantry platoon leader with 101st Airborne Division in Vietnam and as an Advisor to the South Vietnamese forces. He was awarded two Purple Hearts for wounds suffered in combat. After teaching French at West Point, he left the Army and received a law degree from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. He subsequently served as Editor of European Taxation in Amsterdam, The Netherlands.

Upon returning to the United States, Tom studied economics at the Rand Graduate School while working for the Rand Corporation in Santa Monica, CA. He then returned to Europe as an international corporate lawyer at the Archibald law firm in Brussels representing multinational corporations before the European Economic Community. In later years, Tom again worked for the Army as a civilian policy analyst and historian. In 1998, he received his Ph.D. in American and military history from Princeton University.

Tom is the author of a number of books: Battles and Campaigns in Vietnam (1984), The Offering (1987), Battlefront Vietnam (1991), Iron Soldiers (1994), West Point Warriors (2002), Lost Triumph: Lee's Real Plan at Gettysburg and Why it Failed (2005), and Sacred Ties: From West Point Brothers to Battlefield Rivals: a True Story of the Civil War (2010). He is co-author of A Time to Lead: for Duty, Honor, and Country (2007), the autobiography of General Wesley Clark. Currently, Tom is researching his next commercial book.

He presently lives with his wife and two sons in Massachusetts.
