
Jack Waugh
Speaking on
"Re-electing Lincoln:
The 1864 Presidential Campaign"

The Houston Civil War Round Table is pleased to welcome Jack Waugh back to Houston. Mr. Waugh last visited us in May of 2011. On that occasion he spoke to us about Major Maxey and his Confederate Indians. The topic of discussion this month will be Lincoln's 1864 re-election campaign.

One of the more interesting aspects of the American Civil War was that no one seemingly gave any thought to cancelling or rescheduling presidential and congressional elections because of it. (Great Britain, by contrast, held no general elections during either World War in the 20th century.)


Thus the presidential election of 1864 was the most unique and perhaps most critical in American history. Would the country be unified or permanently divided? Would slavery survive, or would it, with so many men on both sides, die in the struggle?

Mr. Waugh's talk will tell of this stirring and dramatic campaign, in which the incumbent president, Abraham Lincoln, found himself pitted against George B. McClellan, a general he had twice raised to high command and twice sacked. It will describe the struggle, drawing on the rich cast of characters that figured in the canvass. It will describe the backroom maneuvering and the issues that shaped the campaign. It will tell how, when all was done, Lincoln, was reelected, proving once again to be one of the most astute politicians in our country's history.

#### **About Mr. Waugh**



Mr. Jack Waugh

John C. "Jack" Waugh is a familiar face to the members of the Houston Civil War Round Table, having spoken to us most recently in May 2011 on the subject of "Maxey and the Indians."

A journalist by trade, Waugh worked for 17 years (1956 to 1973) as a staff correspondent and bureau chief for *The Christian Science Monitor*. In 1972, he won the American Bar Association's Silver Gavel Award for the best national reporting, for a series on American prisons.

He left to become a media specialist on the staff of Vice President Nelson A Rockefeller. He later served for five years as press secretary for Democratic New Mexico Sen. Jeff Bingaman.

Between these stints in the newspaper and political worlds, he began contributing to various magazines and periodicals, including *Civil War History, American Heritage, Civil War Times Illustrated, Columbiad, the Washington Post Book World*, the *New York Times*, the *New Republic*, the *Nation*, the *Los Angeles Times Magazine*, the *Boston Globe*, the *Boston Herald*, and *Country* magazine.


Over the years, he has also been a consultant to various establishments and agencies, such as the National Archives and Records Administration, the US Department of Energy, US Environmental Protection Agency, Atlantic Richfield Co., the President's Council on Environmental Quality, the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS), and West Virginia Public Radio.

He began writing history books on the Civil War era in 1989 and has since written and published 10 — six full-size narratives and four shorter works. He has also collaborated with two co-authors on a book about how historians work. He believes that covering the past is not unlike covering the present. The only difference is that all his sources are dead. (He greatly prefers it that way.) It also means he can return to his favorite century, the 19th, on a daily basis.

His first book, *The Class of 1846* (1993), won the New York Civil War Round Table's prestigious Fletcher Pratt Award for the best non-fiction book on the Civil War. His five other major works are *Reelecting Lincoln* (1997), *Surviving the Confederacy* (2002), *On the Brink of Civil War* (2003), *One Man Great Enough* (2007), and *Lincoln and McClellan* (2010). His shorter works include *Sam Bell Maxey and the Confederate Indians*, (1995), *Last Stand in Mobile*, (2001), *Edwin Cole Bearss: History's Pied Piper* (2003), and *20 Good Reasons to Study the Civil War* (2004).

In 2000 he received the Dallas Civil War Round Table's Grady McWhiney Award of Merit for contributions to the scholarship and preservation of Civil War History. He also holds a History Award Medal from the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Waugh was born in California, raised in Arizona, and now lives in Pantego, Texas. He is a product of the Tucson public schools and the University of Arizona (1951--journalism major, history minor). He is married to Kathleen Diane Lively, a social work administrator and a Texan. He and has two grown children: Daniel, a lawyer in Providence, Rhode Island, and Eliza, a teacher in Austin, Texas. He is grandfather to four grandchildren, two boys and two girls.


