

"Last Chance for Victory: Lee at Gettysburg"

with Scott Bowden



The Battle of Gettysburg (July 1-3, 1863) is one of the pivotal events in American military history. Many Civil War enthusiasts think understand that they Gettysburg. Unfortunately, basis the of this understanding is quite often rooted in the myth and misinformation that surround this epic. At the

center of many of these myths are the decisions and orders given by Robert E. Lee. Scott Bowden, along with his co-author Bill Ward, set out to examine these myths in detail in their book, Last Chance for Victory: Robert E. Lee and Gettysburg. It is a critical examination of Southern leadership in the pivotal campaign of 1863, with the focus on the Confederate commanding general. Mr. Bowden and his coauthor exhaustively analyzed General Lee's decisions, orders and resulting generalship within the context that they occurred.

In his talk, Mr. Bowden will examine what he calls the myths surrounding such enduring controversies as Confederate cavalry commander J.E.B. Stuart's orders prior to the battle, as well as James Longstreet's fabled insistence that Lee "move by the right."


Mr. Bowden will also discuss the issues of Lee's decision to "go north," in the summer of 1863, Lee's understanding of warfare and his style of generalship, and why Lee concentrated the army when and where he did. He will bring all these issues together and lay out the reasons why Lee failed at Gettysburg.

Scott Bowden

Scott Bowden is a graduate of Texas Christian University and nine-time award-winning author of 25 works connected to Napoleonic and American military history. Two of his books are included in the curriculum of the School for Advanced Military Studies at the US Army Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

One of those works, Last Chance for Victory: Robert E. Lee and the Gettysburg Campaign, was named to the Air Force Chief of Staff "Recommended Reading" List -- only the second Civil War title ever to receive such a distinction. Last Chance for Victory also won five literary prizes, including the prestigious Douglas Southall Freeman American History Award.

His other books include Armies on the Danube 1809, Armies at Waterloo, Napoleon's Grande Armee of 1813, and Napoleon and Austerlitz.

His current project is a multi-volume work titled Robert E Lee at War: The Mind and Method of a Great American Soldier.

Mr. Bowden is a frequent speaker at many events and on The History Channel.

On June 30, 1863, A. P. Hill met with two generals of his at Cashtown. Pennsylvania. Brigadier General Johnston Pettigrew reported he had advanced towards Gettysburg to obtain some shoes and other supplies. Having encountered Union troopers near the outskirts, he retreated to Cashtown. The divisional commander then asked Hill: "If there is no objection, I will take my division tomorrow and go to Gettysburg and get those shoes."

Saturday, May 11, 08:00 pm on SD8.2 A Very Bloody Affair - 1862/Forever Free – 1862 Duration: 2:26:30

1862 saw the birth of modern warfare and the transformation of Lincoln's war to preserve the Union into a war to emancipate the slaves. Episode two begins with the political infighting that threatened to swamp Lincoln's administration and then follows Union General George McClellan's ill-fated campaign on the Virginia peninsula. The episode follows the battle of ironclad ships, camp life and the beginning of the end of slavery. Ulysses S. Grant's exploits come to a bloody resolution at the Battle of Shiloh. The episode ends with rumors of Europe's readiness to recognize the Confederacy.

Saturday, May 18, 08:00 pm on SD8.2 Simply Murder – 1863 Duration: 2:26:46

This episode begins with the nightmarish Union disaster at Fredericksburg and follows two clashes that spring: at Chancellorsville in May, where Lee wins his most brilliant victory but loses Stonewall Jackson; and at Vicksburg, where Grant is prevented from taking the city by siege. Also covered is the fierce northern opposition to Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, the miseries of regimental life and the increasing desperation of the confederate home front. As the episode ends, Lee decides to invade the North again to draw Grant's forces away from Vicksburg.

Saturday, May 25, 08:00 pm on SD8.2 Valley of the Shadow of Death - 1864/Most Hallowed Ground – 1864 Duration: 2:26:46

This episode begins with a biographical comparison of Grant and Lee and then chronicles the extraordinary series of battles that pitted the two generals against each other from the wilderness to Petersburg in Virginia. With Grant and Lee finally deadlocked at Petersburg, the episode moves to the ghastly hospitals in both the North and South, and follows Sherman's Atlanta campaign through the mountains of northern Georgia. As the horrendous casualty lists increase, Lincoln's chances for reelection begin to dim and with them, the possibility of Union victory.

Saturday, June 1, 08:00 pm on SD8.2 War Is All Hell - 1865/The Better Angels of Our Nature – 1865 Duration: 2:26:46

William Tecumseh Sherman's March to the Sea brings war to the heart of Georgia and the Carolinas and spells the end of the Confederacy. Following Lincoln's second inauguration, Petersburg and Richmond finally fall to Grant's army. Lee's tattered Army of Northern Virginia flees westward towards Appomattox, where the surrender of Lee to Grant takes place. The episode ends in Washington, DC, where John Wilkes Booth begins to dream of vengeance for the South.
