On November 30, 1864 the Confederate Army of Tennessee launched a series of disastrous frontal assaults against entrenched Union forces around the town of Franklin, Tennessee. The carnage that ensued staggers the imagination, with seventhousand rebels, one in three, falling as casualties before the blazing entrenchments. The recriminations for the Confederate disaster at Franklin began almost before the smoke cleared.


Historians have examined the Battle of Franklin with the assumption that had the outcome been different or had the rebels won the contest, the Civil War might have ended differently, but was that a possibility? Historians have also blamed John Bell Hood for the disaster, but was he responsible? The consciousness of the slaughter at Franklin has lingered in the annals of Civil War history but why? In addition to an account of the battle itself, I will endeavor to answer all of these questions in my presentation.

John R. Lundberg earned his Ph.D. in U.S. History from TCU and is the author of The Finishing Stroke: Texans in the 1864 Tennessee Campaign, Granbury's Texas Brigade: Diehard Western Confederates, as well as numerous articles on Texas and Civil War history. He is an Associate Professor of History at Tarrant County College and lives in Arlington, Texas.
