The HCWRT Presents Ed Bearss Speaking on:

"The Kentucky Campaign and the Battle of Perryville"

The only time the South could have won the war was in that period from August 1862 to October 1862, as they were on the offensive on a 1500-mile front and it was the high-water mark for them. During that period, there were two critical battles that determined the South's fate: Sharpsburg (Antietam) and Perryville. Ed Bearss suggests what might have happened if these events had ended differently, and some factors that impacted the outcomes in Kentucky. If the South had won both battles, the British and French would have recognized the Confederacy and we would have been two countries. Instead, Lee was fought to a draw at Sharpsburg by McClellan and **Buell** tactically lost Perryville but stopped the invasion of Kentucky, which meant it was a strategic victory for the North.

Kirby Smith had won a resounding victory at Richmond, KY. Then he was to join **Bragg** at Perryville for the big push. But he and Bragg did not get along and did not coordinate their efforts. Thus, the South

did not win the conclusive victory they could have over Buell at Perryville.

Unusual factors were the effects (after falling off his horse) of Buellos injury on his decision-making ability, plus the effect of acoustic shadow on Buell, who was within 5 miles of the battle and didn't know about the fighting. The results were that Buell won and stopped Bragg but was fired because he did not pursue Bragg when he withdrew. Kirby Smith was transferred to the Trans-Mississippi. Bragg was promoted and commanded the Army of Tennessee, which he much abused. Because of this Perryville battle and Sharpsburg, the South was not recognized by the Europeans and that was the last chance they would have. From this point until Appomattox, the South had no chance to militarily win by defeating the North. They could only hope for a war of attrition, and the North's exhaustion and giving up-which nearly happened but never did, due greatly to Lincoln's leadership.

Edwin C. Bearss, a U.S Marine veteran of WWII and historian emeritus of the National Park Service, is the most well-known battlefield guide in America and leads military history tours year-

around of the Civil War, American Revolution, American West, and World War I and World War II in Europe. Mr. Bearss is acclaimed as one of the stars of Ken Burns' award-winning PBS series, *The Civil War,* recently re-released in HD clarity and color. In 1956, Ed helped locate and raise the ironclad gun- boat *Cairo*, one of the most significant artifacts of the Civil War.

He is the author of several books, including: Hardluck Ironclad: The Sinking and the Salvage of the Cairo; The Vicksburg Campaign: Volumes I, II and III; Steele's Retreat from Camden & The Battle of Jenkins' Ferry; Forrest at Brice's Cross Roads; Fields of Honor: Pivotal Battles of the Civil War, with James McPherson; Receding Tide: Vicksburg and Gettysburg – Campaigns that Changed the Civil War, with Parker Hills; The Petersburg Campaign: Volumes I and II, with Bruce Suderow.

Ed is recipient of the **Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit** from the Houston Civil War Round Table, along with countless other honors.

The bloody but indecisive Battle of Perryville occurred on Oct. 8, 1862. The Union commander of the Army of the Ohio was removed from office on Oct. 24th due to the slowness of his pursuit.

When US Grant became Lt. Gen. he requested that several officers including this general be restored to duty. The Secretary of War, Edwin Stanton, later told Grant that this officer had been offered an assignment. The general had declined it stating that it would be a degradation since he would have to serve under officers that he had ranked. Grant wrote: Whis was the worst excuse a soldier can make for declining service.+
