## The HCWRT Presents Stephen M. ("Sam") Hood Speaking on:

#### "The Lost Papers of General John Bell Hood"

Scholars hail Confederate General John Bell Hood's personal papers as "the most important discovery in Civil War scholarship in the last half century." This invaluable cache includes documents relating to Hood's U.S. Army service, Civil War career, and postwar life. It includes letters from Confederate and Union officers. unpublished battle reports, detailed medical reports relating to Hood's two major wounds, and dozens of letters exchanged between Hood and his wife Anna. This treasure trove was made available for the first time (2015) for both professional and amateur Civil War historians in The Lost Papers of Confederate General John Bell Hood, edited and annotated by awardwinning author Stephen M. Hood. The historical community long believed General Hood's papers

were lost or destroyed, and numerous books and articles were written about him without the benefit of these invaluable documents. In fact, the papers had been carefully preserved for generations by Hood's descendants. In 2012, collateral descendent Stephen Hood was given access to these papers as part of his research for his book *John Bell Hood: The Rise, Fall, and Resurrection of a Confederate General* (Savas Beatie, 2013).

This 200+ document collection sheds important light on some of the war's lingering mysteries and controversies. For example, letters from Confederate officers help explain Hood's failure to entrap Schofield's Union army at Spring Hill, Tennessee, on November 29, 1864. Another letter by Lt. Gen. Stephen D. Lee helps to explain Maj. Gen. Patrick Cleburne's gallant but reckless conduct that resulted in his death at Franklin. Lee allegations also lodges serious against Confederate Maj. Gen. William Bate's troops. Other papers explain, for the first time, the intent behind Hood's purpose and "controversial" memoir Advance and Retreat. and validate its contents. While these and others offer a military perspective of Hood the general, the revealing letters between he and Anna, his beloved and devoted wife, help us better understand Hood—the man and husband.

#### **About Stephen M. Hood**

Stephen M. ("Sam") Hood is a distant relative of Confederate General John Bell Hood. Sam is a retired industrial construction company owner, and lives in Huntington WV with his wife of 38 years, the former Martha Ann Hager. He is a 1970 graduate of Kentucky Military Institute, and earned a BBA in Marketing from Marshall University in 1976. Sam served in the United States Marine Corps Reserve and has had a life-long interest in the sport of soccer. He is a former Head Men's Soccer Coach at Marshall University, and coached Huntington St. Joseph Catholic High School to West Virginia State Championships in 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1988. He was named West Virginia High School Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1993, and was a charter inductee into the West Virginia High School Soccer Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2010. A former college soccer referee, Sam was a founder of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Soccer Officials Association in 1982. With an abiding interest in Civil War history, Sam is a past member of the Board of Directors of the Blue Gray Education Society of Chatham VA, and is past president of the Board of Directors of Confederate Memorial Hall Museum in New Orleans.

### Eric A. Jacobson 2016 Vandiver Award Recipient

The Houston Civil War Round Table is honored that the 2016 Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit will be presented to **Eric A. Jacobson** at the May 19 meeting.

Since 1982, the HCWRT has presented its prestigious Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit annually in recognition of an individual or an organization making a substantial contribution to the preservation of our Civil War heritage. The Vandiver Award is named for the late Civil War historian and former President of Texas A&M University, the University of North Texas, and Rice University, who also was one of the earliest members of the HCWRT.

Eric is currently the **Chief Executive Officer** and Historian for the **Battle of Franklin Trust**, which manages the **Carter House** and **Carnton Plantation** in Franklin, Tennessee. He was our May 2015 speaker at the Houston Civil War Round Table. At the May 19 HCWRT meeting, Eric will give us an update on the remarkable historic preservation and *reclamation* successes, as well as future plans in Franklin.

#### **About Eric A. Jacobson**

Eric Jacobson has been studying the American Civil War for nearly 25 years. A Minnesota native, Eric lived in Arizona for over a decade. While there he, along with two other principals, started and ran a small business, which grew to over 150 employees by 2003. Eric left Arizona to pursue other interests and relocated to Middle Tennessee in 2005. He is the author of For Cause & For Country: A Study of the Affair at Spring Hill and the Battle of Franklin, a project which encompassed nearly 10 years. The book was published in March 2006 and is considered by some to be one of the most important books ever written about the 1864 Tennessee Campaign.

Eric's second book, *The McGavock Confederate Cemetery*, was published in April 2007. His third book, entitled *Baptism of Fire*, which details the roles of three Federal regiments at the Battle of Franklin, was released in September 2011. He is currently working on his fourth book.

Eric has worked closely with preservation organizations such as the Civil War Trust, Franklin's Charge, and Save the Franklin Battlefield for nearly a decade to reclaim and preserve important sections of the Spring Hill and Franklin battlefields. He has also been one of the driving forces behind the installation of dozens of Civil Wars Trails markers across Middle Tennessee.

He lives in Spring Hill, Tennessee, not far from the battlefield.
