The HCWRT Presents A. Wilson Greene Speaking on:

"Civil War Petersburg"

"The Day was the Jubilee of Fiends in Human Shape and Without Souls: The Battle of the Crater"

The Petersburg Campaign lasted 292 days and involved 79 armed conflicts between June 1864 and April 1865. None of those engagements possesses more notoriety than the brutal fight known as the Battle of the Crater.


Beginning in late June, a regiment of Pennsylvanians--many of them anthracite coal miners from the northeastern part of the state-began excavating a tunnel that eventually stretched more than 500 feet under a prominent Confederate fort southeast of Petersburg. Packing the galleries with 8,000 pounds of black powder, the Pennsylvanians exploded their mine on the morning of July

30. The blast killed more than 300 South Carolinians and Virginians.

What followed involved some of the most horrific hand-to-hand combat every seen on the North American continent. Confusion over orders, drunken and cowardly commanders, and sheer amazement at the results of the explosion conspired against the attackers, who soon crowded into and around the resulting crater. The Confederates quickly recovered from their shock and mounted three counterattacks. eventually restoring shattered lines while inflicting more than 3,800 losses on their opponents.

Many of those casualties were United States Colored Troops. Their experience at the battle and afterward comprise a uniquely disturbing chapter of Civil War history that sheds light on the mindset of Confederate and Union soldiers alike.

Will Greene's talk will explain the origins of the mine, the techniques used to construct it, and the background to the disastrous Federal assault. He will highlight the sequence of Confederate counterattacks, the nature of the fighting that followed, and the significance of the battle in the greater scheme of the contest for Petersburg. His presentation is based on a portion of his forthcoming book, <u>A Campaign of Giants: The Petersburg Campaign</u>, <u>June 12-August 1</u>, 1864, currently in production at the University of North Carolina Press.





About A. Wilson Greene

A. Wilson (Will) Greene is a native of Chicago, Illinois, and was raised in Wheaton, Illinois. He received a B.A. in American History at Florida State University and M.A. in History at Louisiana State University.

Since 1995, Will Greene has served as Executive Director of Pamplin Historical Park and the National Museum of the Civil War Soldier, Petersburg, VA. From 1990 to 1994, he was President and Executive Director. Association for the Preservation of Civil War Sites (now the Civil War Trust). Will's prior career included sixteen years as historian and manager with the National Park Service, including assignments at Fredericksburg National Military Park and Petersburg National Battlefield.

Will is the author of several books, such as: The Second Manassas Campaign, Breaking the Backbone of the Rebellion: The Final Battles of the Petersburg Campaign, and Civil War Petersburg: Confederate City in the Crucible of War. He has published over 20 articles in history journals and contributed to such books as National Geographic Guide to Civil War Battlefield Parks and Conservation Fund Guide to Civil War Battlefields.

He is a frequent study leader, tour leader, and speaker covering all major Civil War campaigns. Will has spoken to more than 100 Civil War Round Tables, *including the HCWRT*, and led many tours for history groups ranging from the Smithsonian Institute to the Delta Queen Steamboat Company, Blue and Gray Education Society, and Civil War Society. He has participated in many symposia and seminars nationwide.

His memberships include: National Advisory Board, Civil War Preservation Trust; Board, Institute of Museum and Library Services (Presidential appointment); and Board, Society of Civil War Historians. He received numerous Awards: Outstanding Southerner by Southern Living Magazine; Austin CWRT Laney Award for Outstanding Book on Civil War History (*Civil War Petersburg*); D. H. Hill Award, North Carolina Civil War Round Table; Nevins-Freeman Award, Chicago Civil War Round Table; and Shelby Foote Preservationist Legacy Award, Civil War Trust.

Will's other Interests include international travel, golf, and minor league hockey.

On Saturday, November 12th, there will be a dedication of a marker to Jacob Hemphill, Co. H, 5th Texas, recipient of one of the nine Gold Stars for Bravery awarded to Hood's Texas Brigade Soldiers in 1864.

The marker is being presented by the SCV Camp #1250 Temple, TX. The ceremony will

take place at 2:00 pm at the North Belton Cemetery (1500 N. Main Street, Belton, TX). The Bell County Chapter #101, UDC will dedicate a Southern Cross to this soldier as well. Also, the Texas Order of the Confederate Rose will participate with a Black Rose Ceremony.
