surrendered. Using Hood's Texas Brigade as a case study, Ural will use diaries from the journey from Virginia as well as postwar accounts to recreate the Texans' and Arkansans' long road home. She will also share some of her findings about Hood's Brigade veterans in the post-war South that challenge our understanding of how these men adapted to the challenges of Reconstruction and the economic devastation that had reshaped their worlds. Some of the stories of Texas soldiers and her findings that will be in her presentation also will be contained in Susannah Ural's new book to be released next year, *Hood's Texas Brigade: The Soldiers and Families of an Elite Confederate Unit*.

In the aftermath of the recent Civil War Sesquicentennial, the HCWRT continues to bring distinguished speakers to Houston who add immensely to our understanding of the lives of former soldiers, as well as the situations of their families and communities on the home front after the guns were silent. The postwar stories of Texas and Texas veterans, beginning with the surrender of the armies at Appomattox and other places, strike particularly close to home for Texans. Dr. Susannah J. Ural of the University of Southern Mississippi, will be discussing the often overlooked story of what happened to Confederate veterans after they

About Susannah J. Ural

Susannah J. Ural, Ph.D. is a Professor and Co-Director of the Dale Center for the Study of War & Society in the history department at the University of Southern Mississippi. A war and society scholar by training, Ural's work focuses on soldiers and families of the U.S. Civil War era. Susannah holds a Ph.D. in history from Kansas State University. She is the author of several books and articles including *The Harp and the Eagle: Irish Catholic Volunteers and the Union Army, 1861-1865* and *Don't Hurry Me Down to Hades: Soldiers and Families in America's Civil War*. Her latest book, *Hood's Texas Brigade: The Soldiers and Families of an Elite Confederate Unit* will be released by LSU Press in November 2017. She serves on the board of the *Journal of Military History, War & Society*, and *Civil War Times*. Ural's next work is a digital history project focused on the over 1800 veterans, wives, and widows who lived at the Confederate Soldier Home, Beauvoir, in Biloxi, Mississippi, from 1903 through 1957. The Beauvoir Veteran Project investigates impoverished Mississippi veterans and their families to see how the war affected them and their communities and how representative they are of larger trends in the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth centuries American South. 

The following day we toured the Battle of Franklin battlefield, visited Carnton Plantation, the Confederate Cemetery there, and the Lotz and Carter houses near the very attractive downtown.
