The HCWRT Presents Jeffrey Hunt Speaking on:

"Meade and Lee at Bristoe Station"

Although most histories of the Civil War skip lightly over events in Virginia between the Battle of Gettysburg and the start of Grant's Overland Campaign, the second half of 1863 was anything but quiet. After returning to the upper Rappahannock River, the Army of the Potomac paused for six weeks on Lincoln's orders, while nearly 10,000 of its troops went north to enforce the draft. The Confederacy took advantage of that lull to transfer James Longstreet's corps from the Army of Northern Virginia to Georgia, where it helped Braxton Bragg win the battle of Chickamauga. In the face of that defeat, the North shifted the XI and XII Corps from the Army of the Potomac to Tennessee in hope of redeeming the desperate situation Chattanooga.

Despite losing one-third of his strength due to Longstreet's departure, Gen. Robert E. Lee took advantage of the Federal countermove by launching a daring offensive against Maj. Gen. George Meade's Army of the Potomac, located inside a treacherous sideways 'V' created by the Rappahannock and Rapidan rivers. What followed was a fast-based campaign of maneuver as Lee sought to land a crippling blow on his opponent, while Meade strove to avoid the thrust by rapidly withdrawing toward For a week, the two armies Centreville. engaged in a race, with violent cavalry actions taking place almost daily as Lee tried to head off Meade's infantry before it slipped beyond his reach. The campaign climaxed in a bloody rearguard action at a place called Bristoe Station.

This campaign, never before studied in depth by Civil War historians, is the subject of the second book in author Jeffrey William Hunt's *Meade and Lee* series of books examining the war in Virginia between Lee's retreat over the Potomac after Gettysburg and the end of active campaigning in December 1863, and will be the subject of his forthcoming presentation before the HCWRT on December 16th.

About Jeffrey Hunt

Jeffrey William Hunt is the Director of the Texas Military Forces Museum at Camp Mabry in Austin, Texas, which is the official museum of the Texas National Guard, and an Adjunct Professor of History at Austin Community College, where he has taught since 1988. Prior to taking the post at the Texas Military Forces Museum in 2007, he was the Curator of Collections and Director of the Living History Program at the Admiral Nimitz National Museum of the Pacific War in Fredericksburg, Texas for 11 years. He holds a bachelor's degree in Government and a master's degree in History, both from the University of Texas at Austin. In 2013, Mr. Hunt was appointed an honorary Admiral in the Texas Navy by Governor Rick Perry, in recognition of his efforts to tell the story of the Texas Navy during the period of the Texas Revolution and Republic.

He is a veteran reenactor, with 35 years of experience conducting, participating in and hosting a wide variety of events ranging from the War of 1812 through the Vietnam War.

Mr. Hunt's is the author of The Last Battle of the Civil War: Palmetto Ranch, Meade and Lee at Bristoe Station: The Problems of Command and Strategy After Gettysburg, From Brandy Station to the Buckland Races, August 1 to October 31, 1863, and Meade and Lee at Rappahannock Station: The Army of the Potomac's First Post-Gettysburg Offensive: From Kelly's Ford to the Rapidan, October 21 to November 21, 1863.

Mr. Hunt is also a contributor to the Essential Civil War Curriculum, The Revised Handbook of Texas, The Gale Library of Daily Life: American Civil War, and North & South Magazine.

The final book in his post-Gettysburg Series, *Meade and Lee at Mine Run,* is forthcoming in 2022.
