### The HCWRT Presents Jennifer Murray speaking on:

### "The Victor of Gettysburg – George Gordon Meade and the Civil War"

Once prominently defined as the "Hero of Gettysburg," General George G. Meade is now commonly obscured by generals deeply embedded into the Civil War narrative - Grant, Sherman, and Sheridan or Lee and Jackson. Indeed, Meade commanded the Army of the Potomac, the North's principal instrument of war, longer than any other commander and assumed a prominent role in the course of the Civil War. Together, we will explore George Meade's role and influence in the Civil War from his command of a brigade in the Pennsylvania Reserves to serving as commanding general of the Army of the Potomac.

# **About Jennifer Murray**

Dr. Jennifer M. Murray is a military historian with a specialization in the American Civil War in the Department of History at Oklahoma State University. She is the author of On A Great Battlefield: The Making, Management, and Memory of Gettysburg National Military Park, 1933 - 2013, published by the University of Tennessee Press in 2014, and The Civil War Begins, published by the U.S. Army's Center of Military History in 2012. Dr. Murray is currently working on a full-length biography of George Meade, tentatively titled Meade at War: The Military Life of George Gordon Meade. This is a comprehensive treatment of Meade's life, with a

focus on his military career in the Army of the She is the co-editor of the Potomac. forthcoming "They Are Dead, And Yet They Live": Civil War Memories in a Polarized America, published with the University of Nebraska Press. Murray is a veteran faculty member at Gettysburg College's Civil War Institute and a coveted speaker at Civil War symposiums and round tables. In addition to delivering hundreds of Civil War battlefield tours, Murray has led World War I and World War II study abroad trips to Europe. She worked as a National Park Service seasonal interpretive park ranger at Gettysburg National Military Park for nine summers (2002 - 2010).




### PRESIDENT'S POST By Keith Altavilla

### PERSONALITIES OF THE CIVIL WAR: GENERAL ALFRED MOUTON



General Alfred Mouton (1829 - 1864) was born in Opelousas, Louisiana. After attending a local college, he enrolled at the U. S. Military Academy. As Mouton grew up speaking only French and wasn't entirely comfortable speaking English at the time he entered West Point, he struggled but managed to complete his studies there and graduated in 1850, 38<sup>th</sup> out of 44 graduates.

After a short period of service with the U. S. Army, Mouton served as a civil engineer with a Louisiana railroad company, then became a sugar cane farmer in Lafayette Parish, Louisiana. At the outbreak of the Civil War, he organized a company of men from his home area, which later became part of the 18<sup>th</sup> Louisiana Infantry Regiment.

After serving in different roles in Louisiana (he was interim commander of the District of West Louisiana, part of the Trans-Mississippi Department), Mouton became a brigade commander under Major General Richard Taylor. Mouton, together with Taylor and cavalry General Tom Green, began deflecting Union efforts to secure the Bayou Teche region. He was a key participant in engagements along Bayou Teche, including the Battle of Irish Bend.

On April 8, 1864, Mouton's brigade took part in the Battle of Mansfield. General Mouton was shot and killed while leading his brigade in a charge against the Union position. Following the war, he was re-interred at St. John's Cemetery in Lafayette, Louisiana.
