Dr. Jerry D. Thompson
“Brig. Gen. Henry Hopkins Sibley
and the 1861-1862 Confederate
Invasion of the New Mexico
Territory”

The Houston Civil War Round Table is pleased to welcome back Dr. Jerry Thompson, who addressed us once before several decades ago. Since 2002, he has Regents Professor of History of the Social Science Department at Texas A&M International University in Laredo.

Louisiana native Henry Hopkins Sibley graduated 30th out of 44 cadets in the West Point Class of 1838, where his fellow cadets included future Confederate Generals P.G.T. Beauregard and William Hardee as well as Union Gen. Irvin McDowell.

Commissioned into the cavalry, he took part in the Seminole and Mexican Wars as well as “Bleeding

Kansas,” the occupation of Texas and the Utah Uprising. He found time to invent the “Sibley Tent,” which would be used by the Union Army throughout the war. They were heated by the “Sibley stove,” which would be used by the US Army in the field almost until the eve of World War II. Union Brig. Gen. Henry Hastings Sibley was a distant cousin.

Resigning from the US Army on May 13, 1861 – the day he was promoted to major – Sibley offered his services to the Confederacy.


After service under Gen. Richard Taylor in Louisiana in 1861, Sibley conceived the New Mexico campaign as a means of bringing Southern sympathizing New Mexico settlers into the Confederacy and seizing the gold and silver mines of Colorado to finance the Confederate war effort. The ultimate goal was to break through to the California coast and circumvent the Union blockade of the Atlantic and Gulf coasts.

In addition to looking at Sibley himself, Dr. Thompson will discuss what he hoped to achieve and exactly what went wrong. In the process, he will also discuss Col. John Robert Baylor and the conquest of the Mesilla Valley in the summer of 1861 before Sibley arrived at Fort Bliss in December of that year. In particular, Dr. Thompson will mention the battles of Valverde and Glorieta Pass, the role of the Union resistance, including the part played by the New Mexico Volunteers, the Colorado “Pikes Peakers” and Brig. Gen. James Henry Carleton's California Column.

Vandiver Award To
John L. Nau, III

In 1982, the Houston Civil War Round Table established the Frank E. Vandiver Award of Merit, named for the first recipient, who had been a member since the mid-1950s and who was a leading authority on the Civil War and past president of Rice University and Texas A&M University until his death in 2005. The award is given each year to an

individual or organization making a substantial contribution to the study of the war.



For this year's award, the board unanimously chose John L. Nau, III, in honor of his magnificent Nau Collection of Civil War artifacts, which was on display earlier this year at the Houston Museum of Natural Science. He has graciously accepted and will give a short talk about how he came to assemble his

collection, as well as his work on the board of the Civil War Trust.

The Nau Civil War Collection is one of the largest private collections of Civil War documents, photographs, weapons, and artifacts in the country. The collection contains items related to all aspects of the war, Union and Confederate.


The collection contains more than 15,000 documents and letters, 2,000 photographic images, and 300 weapons. It also includes a considerable assortment of military accoutrements, equipment, and uniforms.

He is a graduate of the University of Virginia, where he earned a BA in History and currently serves on the Board of Visitors, a position appointed by Virginia's governor. Nau and his wife, Bobbie, reside in Houston, Texas. They have two married daughters and five grandchildren.

We hope you will join us to thank him for his extraordinary work to preserve our Civil War history.

About Dr. Thompson

A native of Arizona, Dr. Thompson earned his bachelor's degree in History from Western New Mexico University in 1964, his master's from the University of New Mexico in 1968, and his doctorate from Carnegie-Mellon in Pittsburgh, PA in 1982. His dissertation was written on Sibley and the New Mexico campaign and was published by Northwestern State University Press in 1987.

His academic awards and publications are too numerous to list, but include the A. M. Pate Award for Best Civil War book on Trans-Mississippi for Civil War and Revolution on the Rio Grande Frontier (2004); serving on the executive committee of the Texas State Historical Commission; Texas A&M University System Teaching Excellence Award; and in 2011 he was elected to the prestigious Texas Institute of Letters.

We welcome Dr. Thompson back to the Houston Civil War Round Table.

Dear HCWRT Members:

Unfortunately, we are still losing money on every meal we serve. Not a great deal (less than \$1), but it all adds up. We have not been informed of any planned price increases by the Briar Club, but a price increase at some point in the future seems inevitable.

The question I would like to place before you is this: would you prefer an increase in the cost of meals of a few dollars, or shall we explore a new venue that might be less costly, but also not as well-appointed as the Briar Club?

I am not asking for a formal vote, but the board members would be interested in hearing your views in writing or in person. The board will make the ultimate decision at our July meeting, but we want to ensure that everyone has a chance to be heard.
